

## Residents Respond to 2002 Survey

City officials and staff would like to thank all the residents who took the time to complete and return the 2002 City of Elmhurst Citizen Survey. The City began in 1994 to survey residents every two years to gain insight into citizens' perceptions of the value and quality of City services, their observations regarding the strengths and weaknesses of the community, and the problems they foresee in the near future. Surveys were mailed in mid-June to 1,600 randomly selected residents. Of the surveys mailed, 845 were completed and returned for a response rate of 52.8%.

Respondents were closely divided between the sexes: 51.8% female and 48.2% male. An overwhelming majority of 96.7% indicated that they own their residences. Slightly over half indicated that they have lived in Elmhurst for more than 20 years. Survey results clearly indicate an overall satisfaction with City services and with the community in general. In nearly all categories respondents reported higher levels of satisfaction than in the previous four surveys. Over 82% of respondents rated City of Elmhurst government operations in general as "good" to "excellent," compared to 77.4% in 2000, 81% in 1998, 76% in 1996 and 65% in 1994. In the "Quality of Life" section, over 93% of 2002 respondents rated the quality

## Running for Public Office



Residents interested in serving their community as an elected official are encouraged to run for local public office. Elections will be held on Tuesday, April 1, 2003, to fill seven aldermanic seats on the Elmhurst City Council. The elections will also fill four positions on the School District 205 Board of Education and three on the Park District Board of Commissioners. Packets are available at the following locations:

- For City Council positions – City Clerk's office in City Hall, 209 N. York Street
- For School Board positions – School Board offices, Finance Department, 130 W. Madison
- For Park District Board positions – Park District offices in Wilder Park, 225 Prospect.

Nominating papers are required to run for these elected offices and must be filed between January 13 and January 21.

## Chief Millner to Retire

On January 2, 2003, Chief of Police John Millner will retire from the Elmhurst Police Department. Millner began his career with Elmhurst in 1972 and rose through the ranks from patrol officer to Chief of Police in 1986. He is an active member of many international, national, state, county and local criminal justice organizations. He has received numerous awards for his service and achievements in law enforcement. He is past president of the Illinois Chiefs of Police and a renowned instructor.



Under Chief Millner's leadership, the Elmhurst Police Department has become one of the most progressive and respected police departments in the state. The department has developed specialized training, use of high-tech crime fighting and evidence equipment, and initiated many innovative community-oriented policing

programs, such as Citizens Police Academy, Community Oriented Policing Unit, and Seniors and Law Enforcement Together (SALT).

of their neighborhoods as "good" to "excellent," compared to 92% in 2000, 91% in 1998, 82.3% in 1996 and 82.9% in 1994. The number of respondents with access to the Internet has risen: 79.2% in 2002, compared to 69.5% in 2000 and 61% in 1998, with most people reporting that they use the Internet daily. Many indicated an interest in conducting City business electronically via the Internet. Parking-related responses all indicated lower levels of satisfaction than in previous surveys. Satisfaction with commuter parking and shopper parking both declined in comparison to previous surveys.

Central location/convenience, quality of life and quality of schools were the three things respondents liked most about Elmhurst. Property value was a close fourth. The three things respondents liked least were taxes, airplane noise and traffic congestion. The three biggest problems respondents think Elmhurst will face in the next five years are airplane noise/airport expansion, cost of living/affordability and taxes.

Survey results have been shared with School District 205, the Elmhurst Park District, the Elmhurst Public Library, Chamber of Commerce, City Centre and the Elmhurst Economic Development Corporation. The survey results provide an excellent "snapshot" of the opinions, concerns and priorities of Elmhurst residents and are used by City officials as they prepare upcoming budgets and set goals for the future. Copies of the 2002 survey results are available for review at the Elmhurst Public Library and at City Hall.

## Calling 9-1-1 from a Cell Phone

Cell phone use has increased dramatically in the last few years and, in an emergency situation, callers need to know some important details about calling 9-1-1 from a cell phone. With DuPage County's enhanced 9-1-1 system, when you call 9-1-1 from your residence phone, the location is displayed on the dispatcher's computer screen. When you call 9-1-1 from a cell phone, however, the location is not displayed on the computer screen and you must communicate certain information to the dispatcher. Following is a list of important tips to keep in mind when calling 9-1-1 from a cellular phone:

- Make driving safety a priority. Pull off the road and call 9-1-1 to report emergencies.
- Tell the 9-1-1 dispatcher that you are calling from a cell phone.
- Give the dispatcher your cell phone number or another number where you can be reached.




- Stay calm and give the dispatcher as many details as possible, including the nature of the emergency (police, fire, ambulance).
- Do not put yourself in danger. Stay near the emergency location only if it is safe to do so.
- Teach the passengers in your car how to use the cell phone.
- Be aware at all times of your location. Look for details that will help you remember exactly where you are in case of an emergency. Know which city or county you are traveling through, your direction, and the name or number of the road or highway. Pay attention to highway exit numbers and mile markers. These details will help emergency personnel pinpoint your location.

In DuPage County, most cell phone calls to 9-1-1 go to the DuPage Sheriff's Dispatch Center. From there the call is transferred to the dispatch center for the jurisdiction where the call originated. Please keep in mind that you will have to tell the dispatcher your location.

# Keeping Your Family Safe

## Fireplace Safety

There is something special about gathering around a glowing fireplace on a cold winter evening. Many new homes are being built with one or several fireplaces, and many homeowners are having fireplaces installed in existing homes. Proper installation, maintenance and use



of the fireplace will help make it a safe and enjoyable experience for the whole family.

- When buying a factory-built fireplace, choose one listed by a testing laboratory and have it professionally installed in compliance with municipal codes. House fires are often linked to improperly installed fireplaces. Improper installation can also cause a dangerous buildup of carbon monoxide in the home.
- Have your chimney professionally inspected every year and cleaned, if necessary, prior to the beginning of the heating season.
- Use only thoroughly dried hardwood in your fireplace. This will prevent or slow the buildup of creosote, a chemical substance that forms when wood burns, which is the cause of many chimney fires.
- Be sure to protect your family and home by using a sturdy fireplace screen or tempered glass doors whenever the fireplace is in use.
- Burn only wood in your fireplace. Burning paper or pine branches can float out of the chimney and ignite your roof or your neighbor's home.
- Keep combustible materials away from the fireplace and never use flammable liquids in it.
- Don't burn a fire in the fireplace if there are stockings or other holiday decorations on or around it.

Although following these precautions should make fireplace use safer, you should be aware of the signs of a chimney fire and know what to do if you encounter them — a loud roar, sucking sounds, shaking pipes, hot spots on the wall or chimney, or smoke in the house or apartment. If you hear or see any of these sounds shut off the fire's air supply, get everyone out of the house quickly, and call 9-1-1 from a neighbor's phone.

## Carbon Monoxide and Smoke Detectors

The 2002 Elmhurst Citizen Survey indicated that a vast majority of Elmhurst residents (97.58%) have one or more smoke detectors in their homes.

However, over 30% of survey respondents reported that their homes are not equipped with another essential safety feature – carbon monoxide detectors. Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas that can kill without warning. Every home should be protected by at least one CO detector. Ideally, there should be one on every floor, especially near sleeping areas.

Although the vast majority of residents have smoke detectors in their homes, the alarms must be functioning properly in order to provide the early warning you need to escape from a fire. The majority of fatal fires occur during nighttime hours. Without the early warning that smoke alarms provide, many victims die in their sleep from inhaling smoke and toxic gases. After your alarm sounds, you may have less than 2-1/2 minutes to escape.

There are three ways to ensure that your alarms are always working properly.

- Install new batteries in all smoke alarms at least once a year, for example, on the day you change your clocks or when the alarm chirps to warn you that the battery is dying.
- Test all smoke alarms monthly by using the alarm's "test button" or an approved smoke substitute.
- Replace smoke detectors after ten years. Modern smoke detectors have a 3% failure rate per year, meaning that 3% will fail by the end of the first year, 6% by the end of the second, etc. After 10 years 30% will have failed. After 15 years, the chances are greater than 50/50 that the alarm has failed, which seems too big a risk to take. After 30 years almost all alarms will have failed, with most failing many years earlier.

Remember, installing a smoke detector on every floor of your home and, even better, one in every sleeping area in your home is the best way to protect yourself and your loved ones in case of fire. Be sure to replace the batteries yearly, test the alarms monthly and replace them every ten years or sooner if they fail the monthly test.

Every home should be protected by at least one CO detector.

The interactive fountain consists of four large granite pieces with water flowing over one surface of each piece in a different manner. The sculpture is set in a base of limestone, representing the importance of natural resources and the role they have played in the history of the City. One of the stones in the fountain is a representation of the "Big Rock," once a favorite spot for local children swimming in Salt Creek. The original "Big Rock" has since been moved to the east lawn of the Elmhurst Historical Museum.


## Elmhurst Fine Arts Festival Coming in February

## Toy Collection Sites

## Leaf Collection & Yard Waste Reminders



- The last free leaf pick-up for the year will be on your regular refuse collection day, either December 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup>, 2002. *Please remember that it is illegal to rake leaves into the street. Violations can result in court fines of up to \$500 per violation.*
- Yard waste collection will end on November 30, 2002, and resume the first week of April 2003.

## City Hall Holiday Hours

City Hall will be closed on Thursday, November 28 and Friday, November 29 for the Thanksgiving holiday. City Hall will close at noon on Tuesday, December 24 and will be closed all day on Wednesday, December 25 and Wednesday, January 1, 2003. As a reminder, the normal hours of operation for City Hall are from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. The Finance Department counter remains open until 7:00 p.m. on the first and third Monday evenings unless a holiday falls on a Monday.

## Holiday Refuse Collection

- During Thanksgiving week, refuse will be collected on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday (one day late for residents with Thursday or Friday pick-up). Refuse pick-up during the weeks of Christmas and New Year's Day will be delayed by one day for all Elmhurst residents since both holidays fall on Wednesdays.
- Holiday wreaths, garlands, wrapping paper and packing peanuts will be collected with your regular garbage. Boxes may be recycled if they are flattened, bundled or bagged, and measure no more than three feet by three feet.
- Christmas trees will not require a sticker if placed for collection on your regular collection day during the first and second weeks in January. After the second week in January, BFI will pick up trees with one refuse sticker attached. All tinsel, ornaments, lights and nails must be removed. Trees should not be put in a plastic bag. *The Park District no longer accepts Christmas trees in any of the parks.*

## Water & Wastewater

The City's department of Water/Wastewater provides three essential services to the residents of Elmhurst – operation of the City's potable (drinking) water supply, operation of the wastewater collection and treatment system, and operation of the storm water pumping facilities.

The department operates the three entry points for Lake Michigan water, the City's source of fresh drinking water. Water enters Elmhurst at over 100 pounds of pressure and is reduced to the Elmhurst system pressure at each of the three pressure reducing stations. Associated with the pressure reducing stations are the three water storage reservoirs and three elevated water tanks, totaling 15 million gallons of storage capacity. To ensure that the water supplied to Elmhurst residents meets all the U.S. EPA and Illinois EPA water quality standards, the City samples the water regularly for concentrations of various metals, compounds and other contaminants. These samples include over 50 each month to measure bacteriological purity alone.

As part of the wastewater treatment system, the department is responsible for the operation and maintenance of 10 sanitary pumping stations that pump wastewater from various parts of Elmhurst to the Wastewater Treatment Plant. The WWTP itself has the capability of pumping over 70 million gallons of wastewater per day and utilizes an advanced activated sludge process capable of filtering suspended and dissolved materials from the water. The plant is operated under a permit issued by the Illinois EPA and is closely monitored to ensure that the water quality of the effluent meets or exceeds the limits imposed by the permit. The quality of wastewater plant effluents has significantly improved the water quality conditions in Salt Creek.

The department also operates 13 storm water pumping stations and water retention reservoirs located around Elmhurst that are part of the network of flood protection for the community. All of the remote facilities for potable water, sanitary pumping and the storm water system are monitored and can be operated remotely from a central control room.


The Water/Wastewater Department is made up of Director Dennis Streicher, two supervisors, lift station/water production operators, electricians, maintenance and operation staff.



## Museum Wins Top Awards

The Illinois Association of Museums recently presented two *Awards of Excellence* to the Elmhurst Historical Museum for projects during the year 2001, noting that the projects are tremendous models for the profession. One award was given for "Made in Elmhurst," an exhibit that showcased more than 100 years of the creative arts and industrial arts in Elmhurst. The second award went to "Historic Highlights," a half page column of historical information and photographs featured in the *Elmhurst Press*. The "Highlights" are great reading and are available on the museum Website. The Illinois Association of Museums is a statewide network of art, history, children's and science museums, historical and genealogical societies, zoos, nature centers, arboreta and other cultural agencies. Be sure to check out the museum sometime soon for other great programs and exhibits.

## Winter Weather Reminders



- City ordinances prohibit street parking for eight hours following a snowfall of two inches or more, or while snow removal is in progress.
- When clearing your property of snow, please do not put snow or ice in the street as this creates a hazardous condition for motorists.
- Snow plows clear from the center of the street to the curb, usually in a series of four passes. During the final operation, some snow is inevitably pushed onto private driveway approaches. To avoid having to clear your driveway approach twice, you may want to wait until the street has been cleared before clearing your approach.
- Residents with sump pumps that are not connected to the City's storm sewers are reminded that it is illegal to discharge water onto sidewalks or streets. This condition is especially hazardous during the winter months when ice can create a safety hazard for pedestrians and/or motorists. The City's Rear Yard Drain Program was designed to reduce standing water due to natural low spots and to remove sump pump discharge from private property. The City provides financial assistance on a cost-sharing basis to residents who would like to alleviate this problem on their property.

## Additional Downtown Shopper Parking

As part of the City's review of traffic patterns and parking in the downtown area, a change was recently made on a trial basis to increase shopper parking on First Street between Addison Avenue and York Street. Parking on the north side of First was converted from parallel to diagonal, resulting in an increase of eight parking spaces on the block, a combination of two-hour and 15-minute parking. The change will be evaluated to determine whether it meets the needs of the public and the businesses in the block. Business owners requested additional parking after a significant number of spaces were lost when Metra converted 22 parking spaces to nine spaces for disabled commuters and four regular spaces. ## Foreign Lottery Scams

Picture this scenario! A trusting person, usually a senior citizen, receives a letter or a phone call congratulating him on winning \$4 million in the Canadian lottery. He is told that the only thing preventing him from collecting his winnings is that he has to prepay taxes and U.S. Customs fees and he has to do it right away. He has no time to think about it and no time to call a trusted friend or family member for advice. He rushes to the bank, withdraws thousands of dollars from his savings account and quickly wires or mails the money to an address in Canada. He then waits anxiously for his winnings to arrive. This story does not have a happy ending. The money never arrives because this trusting gentleman has become a victim of the Canadian lottery scam. Each year this scam bilks Americans out of millions of dollars of their hard-earned savings. Most of the victims are senior citizens.



Sometimes a new twist is added to the Canadian lottery scam. The initial call or letter is followed by a check in the amount of \$10,000 payable to the victim. The check looks legitimate. It is stamped "Certified" and drawn on a bank in Montreal but there is no address or phone number for the account holder. As soon as he deposits the check, he is contacted again and told that he must quickly wire money for taxes on the winnings to a destination outside the U.S. He is told that his remaining winnings will be distributed over the next few months. The \$10,000 check is eventually returned as counterfeit and the so-called winnings never arrive.

Other foreign lottery frauds, such as the Northwest German State lottery and the Australian lottery, promise millions in winnings and odds as high as one chance in two of winning. If you purchase one foreign lottery ticket, your name will be placed on a "sucker list" and you can expect to be deluged with phony offers for investment and lottery opportunities.

If you have elderly friends or relatives, the Elmhurst Police Department requests that you alert them to these and other scams, and caution them that if an offer seems too good to be true, it almost always is.

## Railroad Safety

With the arrival of winter weather, slippery conditions and poor visibility, the Elmhurst Police Department would like to remind both pedestrians and motorists to use extra caution when approaching a railroad crossing.

- **Watch the second track.** If you dart out after the train passes, you may walk or drive into the path of another train on the second track. Wait until you have good visibility and the warning devices indicate "all clear" before you start across the tracks.
- **Don't get caught on the tracks.** Don't drive onto the tracks until you are certain you can drive all the way across. Get everyone out of the car if it stalls (or you get boxed in) on the tracks. If a train is approaching, try to flag a warning to it. If the tracks are clear in both directions, have someone try to get the car off the tracks.
- **Don't stop once you start.** If you start across the tracks and the lights or gates warn of an approaching train, keep going. You will have enough time to clear the tracks on the other side.
- **Be extra alert at night or during bad weather.** Don't overdrive your headlights. You may suddenly see a train when you are driving too fast or are too close to stop. One of four crossing accidents involves a motor vehicle driving into a train.

When it comes to railroad safety, you can't be too careful!

## World War II Stories



Visitors at the museum beginning December 7 will have the special opportunity to look at World War II from two points of view. One approach is *World War II Posters: The Social Influences of Wartime Information*, an exhibit of 32 war era posters that are among thousands produced during the war. The posters tell stories of strong and noble soldiers, virtuous and compassionate women, and an evil and misguided enemy. They look outward at a nation seeking reassurance and common purpose.

A second approach is taken by *Holiday on the Homefront*, an exhibit that tells a story of celebration and ritual amid times of worry and anxiety. Elmhurst families struggled to carry on holiday traditions during the war years, during years when husbands and brothers bore arms on foreign soil and years of rationing of many consumer products on the homefront. The

exhibit looks inward at how the holiday season became one means for folks in Elmhurst to persevere through years of national troubles.
