Protecting our Trees



One of Elmhurst's most attractive features is the wide variety of trees that surround our homes, beautify our parks and public property, and protect the environment.

Elmhurst was recently recognized by the National Arbor Day Foundation for the 22nd

year as "Tree City USA" for its outstanding tree planting and maintenance program. That record of 22 years as a "Tree City" is the second best in the State of Illinois. Congratulations to the Forestry Division!

Dutch Elm Disease Injection Program

In a continuing effort to improve the City's urban forest, the Elmhurst City Council approved a program to assist residents with the cost of injecting their American Elms with a fungicide to help prevent Dutch Elm Disease infection. The plan offers a 50/50 cost-share to residents for either parkway or private elm trees. The total injection cost is discounted from the typical market rate to further increase the

likelihood that residents will take this preventative action. Although fungicide injections are the best-known preventative treatment for Dutch Elm Disease, they are not guaranteed. A representative from the Morton Arboretum explained, "While fungicide injections seem to be a positive means to combat Dutch Elm Disease, it is no guarantee that the trees will be spared. Trees are very much like people, what helps one tree may or may not be effective on another and we can't give a 100% guarantee." The most important aspect of the City's Dutch Elm Disease Prevention Program is its aggressive surveillance and sanitation.

Elmhurst Always Remembers



From the Revolutionary War to the War on Terrorism, dedicated men and women have served in the armed forces and sacrificed to protect the freedoms we enjoy. On Monday, May 27, Elmhurst residents and visitors will remember and pay tribute to the officers and enlisted personnel, past and present, of our nation's military.

One of the highlights of the 84th annual Elmhurst Memorial Day Parade will be the "Ground Zero Flag Tour," a display of flags signed at Ground Zero to honor the heroes of September 11th and their loved ones, the Ground Zero workers and the people of New York. The flags will be carried on an Elmhurst fire truck and will be preceded in the parade by the Elmhurst Police Department Color Guard. The City will provide a municipal flag, which will be available at Wilder Park following the Memorial Day ceremony and at City Hall later in the week for anyone who would like to add his or her signature.

The parade will also feature military officers and enlisted men and women, costumed Civil War re-enactors, floats and musical groups, including drums and bugles, bagpipes and marching bands. The parade will step off from York and Third at 9:30 a.m., and will proceed to the Veterans Memorial in Wilder Park by way of York Street, Robert Palmer Drive and Church Street. The parade is sponsored by the City of Elmhurst, Elmhurst Chamber of Commerce & Industry, Elmhurst American Legion T.H.B. Post 187 and Elmhurst Veterans of Foreign Wars Walter A. Glos Post 2048.

The Grand Marshal for this year's parade will be WW II Navy veteran Michael N. Kuryla, Jr., a survivor of the U.S.S. Indianapolis. Only 317 of some 900 men were rescued from shark-infested waters (300 died on board) after the heavy cruiser was torpedoed and sank returning from a secret mission.

Following the parade, a full military ceremony with speakers, wreath laying and patriotic music will take place at the Veterans Memorial. The American Legion will place rows of white crosses in Wilder Park to honor Elmhurst residents killed during World Wars I and II, the Korean War, Vietnam and Desert Storm. (Flowers may be placed next to the crosses.)

Bring your camera and enter your photos of the parade and ceremony in a contest for future publicity purposes—in color or black and white, no larger than 5x7. Submit to the Elmhurst Chamber of Commerce, 113 Adell Place, by June 12.

Reminder: Family members or friends may have deceased veterans honored at the Memorial. Call Bill Ralston at 279-5588 for information and dates still available.

These practices consist of extensive inspections of American Elms on public and private property from May to September, early 'prune-out' of limbs showing signs of disease, disease testing and, if necessary, prompt removal of infected trees. The Forestry Division is also committed to planting new disease-resistant Elm trees to ensure the future of the American Elm in Elmhurst. Interested residents are encouraged to contact the Public Works Department at 530-3020 for more details.

Gypsy Moth Update

The Gypsy moth, a leaf-feeding insect native to Europe, southern Asia and Africa, is a serious threat to many forests and ornamental trees. The insect was brought to Massachusetts from Europe in 1869 as part of a silkworm-crossbreeding program. Unfortunately, a windstorm blew open some cages containing Gypsy moths and the caterpillars escaped. The Gypsy moth has now spread throughout the northeastern and mid-western portions of the United States. Gypsy moths spread by 'hitching rides.' The egg masses and other life stages are frequently found on cars, recreational vehicles, firewood, nursery stock, trailers, etc. The infestation can be lessened somewhat if Illinois travelers inspect their vehicles and firewood when they return to Illinois from infested areas, such as Wisconsin and Michigan. The easiest Gypsy moth life cycle to identify is the caterpillar, which has characteristics not found on other leaf-feeding caterpillars. The caterpillars usually begin hatching in April. The bodies have five pairs of blue dots followed by six pairs of red dots and are covered with hairs. Full-size adult caterpillars are one and a half to two inches long. Gypsy moth caterpillars do not form web tents or large pouches like the eastern tent caterpillar or fall webworm.

The Illinois Department of Agriculture is the agency primarily responsible for monitoring and implementing control efforts in areas infested with Gypsy moth. Currently state traps set in Elmhurst show no infestation within the City. The state is spraying as a preventative measure in areas of limited infestation. Currently, Lake County is the only county in Illinois under quarantine. Elmhurst forestry staff is working with the Illinois Department of Agriculture and is monitoring for signs of infestation. If residents believe they have seen Gypsy moth caterpillars on their property, they should contact the Department of Public Works at 530-3020.

Family Fun on the Fourth of July

The 4th of July is a day for family celebrations, picnics and parades. Elmhurst's annual July 4th parade will step off from the corner of York and Third at 11:00 a.m. on Thursday, July 4th. Following the parade, the Elmhurst Historical Museum and the Elmhurst Park District will host the annual Ice Cream Social, featuring cool treats and live entertainment on the museum lawn, 120 E. Park.



Fireworks are a popular part of the July 4th celebration. They are, however, responsible for thousands of hospital emergency room visits each year. Fireworks are not toys for children or adults, and are illegal in Illinois without a permit. Although the term "fireworks" does not include sparklers, smoke devices, snake and glowworm pellets, and trick noisemakers, even such seemingly harmless devices can be dangerous, especially in the hands of children. Sparklers, for example, reach temperatures of up to 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit and they remain hot enough to cause serious burns even after they are extinguished. Fireworks are responsible not only for injuries during the summer months, but also for numerous fires. For safety reasons, it is best to leave fireworks to the professionals.

Elmfest 2002

Mark the second weekend in June on your calendar and be sure to attend Elmhurst's award-winning community festival in downtown Elmhurst. Elmfest is celebrating its 20th anniversary this year and will feature a variety of food items, great musical, theatrical and dance entertainment on two stages and carnival rides for the kids. Festivities will begin on Friday, June 7th at 11:00 a.m. and will conclude with a free Elmhurst Symphony Orchestra family concert on the Elmhurst College Mall at 6:30 p.m. on Sunday, June 9th. (The Jaycees carnival will be open on Thursday, June 6th from 6:00 to 10:00 p.m. and throughout Elmfest weekend.) Elmfest is sponsored by the Elmhurst Chamber of Commerce, the City of Elmhurst, the Elmhurst Park District, Elmhurst College and the Elmhurst Jaycees. Vehicle Sticker Requirements



City of Elmhurst vehicle stickers should have been purchased and properly displayed on the lower right passenger side of the windshield by May 1. Tickets are issued by the Elmhurst Police for failing to display

a City of Elmhurst sticker on any vehicle that is registered or principally garaged in Elmhurst. During the month of May, the fine for non-compliance is \$25. After May 31, the fine is \$50. This does not include the cost of the sticker, which must be purchased. Revenue raised through the sale of vehicle stickers is used to provide for street maintenance. Elmhurst residents are encouraged to do their fair share by purchasing a vehicle sticker for each motor vehicle in the household. Stickers may be purchased at the Finance Department counter in City Hall. Transfer and replacement stickers are \$1 each.



Bicycle Safety Tips

Children love riding bikes but they are especially prone to accidents due to immature motor and balancing skills, lack of judgement and improper equipment. The following suggestions are offered to help parents keep their children safe as they ride.

The first step is to make sure your child has the proper equipment to ride safely.

- **Buy a bike that fits the child.** The child should be able to grip the handlebars while seated on the bike. The balls of both feet must be able to touch the ground.
- **Buy the child an approved bike helmet** and teach him/her to wear it properly with the chinstrap buckled whether riding on a street, sidewalk, bike trail or driveway.
- **Teach the child to dress appropriately** - covered shoes to protect the feet and clothing that cannot become entangled in the bike chain.

The next step is to teach your child to ride safely by obeying the following rules.

- **Always wear a helmet.** Helmets can prevent approximately 85% of bicycling head injuries.
- **Never ride out into a street without stopping first.** Just because the child sees the car does not mean the driver sees the child.
- **Ride on the right with the flow of traffic.** Teach the child to ride in a straight line, change direction without swerving and use hand signals when turning. (Riding against the flow of traffic is illegal.)
- **Obey stop signs and stop lights.** Teach the child to stop and look both ways at stop signs, stop lights and intersections before crossing. Teach him/her that when riding with a group, each rider must stop and make sure the traffic has cleared before crossing. Younger children should walk their bikes across busy intersections.
- **Check behind you, signal and look behind again before swerving, turning or changing lanes.**
- **Never follow another rider without applying the rules.** Many fatal bike accidents occur when the first rider violates one of the above rules and the second rider follows blindly.

The last step is to ride with your child as he or she practices safe bicycling skills. Children under the age of nine are not able to identify and adjust to dangerous traffic situations and should not be allowed to ride their bikes in the street. Children should not be allowed to ride their bikes after dark, or on wet or slippery streets. May is Bicycle Safety Month — let's keep our children safe while they enjoy the great sport of bicycling.

Child Car Seat Checks

Auto accidents injure or kill thousands of young children each year. Many of these tragedies could have been prevented if the youngsters had been properly restrained in safety seats, boosters or seat belts. However, national statistics show that 85-90 percent of the time, either the car seat is installed incorrectly or the child is improperly secured in the car seat. Infants need to be secured in properly installed rear-facing infant seats. (*Expectant parents should purchase an infant car seat and have the installation checked well before the baby's arrival. Illinois State law prohibits hospitals from releasing newborn infants if the parents' vehicle does not contain an infant safety seat.*) Older babies and toddlers should be restrained in forward-facing child safety seats. Many modern forward-facing seats convert to belt-positioning booster seats for use until the child is big enough to fit properly in an adult seat belt.

As a community service and to enhance the safety of Elmhurst's smallest passengers, the Elmhurst Fire Department offers free inspections of child car seats by one of the department's six trained and nationally certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians. The inspection and information session takes approximately 45 minutes to one hour. Please call the Fire Department at 530-3090 for an appointment.

Youth Service Awards

Teaching Children Fire Safety

"Learn Not to Burn" is a fire safety program taught by the Elmhurst Fire Department to approximately 700 public, private and parochial school 4th graders throughout the school year. The five-week program helps children understand what fire is, how to prevent fires from starting and what to do in case of fire. Topics covered include the fire triangle, fire classifications, fire hazards in the home, home escape planning and burn prevention.

This year the Fire Department started a new program – "Cool Rules about Fire Safety" – to reach the 700 or so Elmhurst 1st graders. The program introduces fire safety attitudes to young children and covers stop, drop and roll; crawling low in smoke; checking smoke detectors; and dialing 9-1-1. Fire Department personnel teach the 30-minute classes once a week for three weeks.

Parents are encouraged to participate in their child's fire safety education by reinforcing the "Learn Not to Burn" and "Cool Rules" objectives, and by drawing up and practicing home escape plans. If you have questions about either of these programs, please call the Fire Department at 530-3090.



Lawn and garden sprinkling (except hand-watering) for even-numbered addresses is allowed on Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 8:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. the following morning. Residents with odd-numbered addresses are asked to sprinkle on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 8:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. Residents are asked not to sprinkle on Sunday.



Water Quality Reports

The 2001 Water Quality Reports will be mailed to Elmhurst residents by July 1. This annual report provides a detailed description of the various properties of the public water supply and any changes that may have occurred. The report's purpose is to educate and assure the community that the municipal water supply meets or exceeds quality standards set by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.



Police to Hold Auction

The annual Elmhurst Police Department auction will be held on Saturday, June 15, at the Elmhurst Police Station, 125 E. First Street, in downtown Elmhurst. Items to be auctioned include bicycles, cell phones, cameras, jewelry, a boom box and other recovered items, as well as surplus City equipment. Annual parking permits are available for purchase in the City Collector's office in City Hall. Yearly permits are sold on a pro-rated basis throughout most of the calendar year but are non-refundable. The annual parking permit is offered strictly as a convenience and does not involve any discount over purchasing quarterly passes four times a year.



Elmhurst Building Permits and Codes

Before you begin a construction or remodeling project this summer, call the Development Department at 530-3030 to find out if you need a building permit and whether drawings, site plans, etc. are needed for your project. Permits are required for the construction of new homes, attached or detached garages, structure additions, porches and decks, sheds and accessory structures, driveways and fences. Permits are also required for interior remodeling, electrical service revisions, air conditioning installation,

signs, swimming pools and hot tubs, and revisions to plumbing and fixtures.

The City of Elmhurst adheres to a strict building code designed to improve fire safety factors, especially those related to fire spread. Lives are saved when a fire is contained to the room of origin for a longer period of time. Before hiring architects or builders, make sure

they are familiar with Elmhurst codes and willing to adhere to them. This will decrease the chance of jobs being underbid or delayed due to the submission of incomplete or incorrect plans. Call the Development Department at 530-3030 for more information.

City Way-Finding Signage



The City of Elmhurst has established a way-finding plan and signage program for its greater downtown area. The program addresses the needs of both commercial business owners and cultural institutions for directional signage, while maintaining the area's established character. A hierarchy of signage was created to unify the downtown area, highlight businesses and cultural attractions, and direct visitors to destination points. Freestanding informational/directional signs were installed in several locations to direct pedestrian traffic to areas of interest. In August of 2001, downtown business people, area residents and public officials participated in a Visual Preference Survey Workshop. In response to the question, "What is your favorite sign in downtown Elmhurst?" the new way-finding signs ranked second behind the York Theatre marquee. On April 17, 2002, the Elmhurst Economic Development Council presented the City with a beautification award for the way-finding signage. This successful project has led to the design of similar City entryway signs, as well as a new design for a City Centre gateway project. "CPR for Family and Friends"



The Elmhurst Fire Department will offer "CPR for Family and Friends," an American Heart Association non-certification class, at Fire Station #1, 404 N. York, on Tuesday, June 11th; Saturday, August 3rd; Saturday, October 12th; and Tuesday, December 3rd. Saturday classes are held from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and Tuesday classes from 6:00 to 10:00 p.m. The class covers clearing airway obstructions and administering CPR to infants, children and adults. The course is intended for individuals over the age of 12 who are not in the medical field. There is a charge of \$5.00 per participant and class size is limited to 25 students. Call 530-3090 to make a reservation.

Responsible Pet Ownership



Pet owners are reminded of the following City ordinances regarding responsible pet ownership.

- Dogs must be properly restrained at all times when off the owner's property. A dog is considered properly restrained if it is controlled by means of a leash or chain securely attached to its collar or harness.
- It is unlawful to allow a pet to trespass on private or public property anywhere in the City.
- Owners are required to clean up after their pets. This applies to pets being walked on public sidewalks and parkways, along the Prairie Path, in parks or elsewhere in the City.

Pet owners who violate these regulations can be ticketed, which could result in up to \$1,000 in court-ordered fines.

Native American Culture

Annual parade steps off from York & 3rd St.

Through August 31


