Shop Elmhurst First

Are you planning to go out for dinner tonight? Before you head off to a neighboring suburb, consider the fine dining opportunities available right here in Elmhurst. Whether you have a taste for Italian, Irish, Mexican, Mediterranean, Cantonese, Szechwan, or a mouth-watering all-American steak or deli-style sandwich, Elmhurst has just what you're looking for. If a shopping trip is on your afternoon agenda, Elmhurst has jewelry, gifts, flowers, furs, new cars, clothing,

linens and much, much more. Part of every sales tax dollar you spend in Elmhurst is used to help fund important city services, such as

- police and fire protection
- street resurfacing and maintenance
- snow removal and street cleaning
- storm sewer maintenance
- public property tree planting and maintenance

Your sales tax dollars help keep our community strong. Sales tax receipts

for Elmhurst total more than two-and-a-half times the amount collected through the City's portion of the property tax. Imagine what your City property tax would be if sales tax disappeared entirely. On the other hand, as sales tax revenues grow, the City's property tax can be reduced. The money you spend here in Elmhurst does make a difference.



Electronic Animal Control Fences

Late last year the Elmhurst City Council passed a revision to the Elmhurst Municipal Code chapter on animal control. This action was taken in response to a number of incidents related to the use of electronic fences by animal owners. In one case, a large dog charged toward the electronic fence, causing a pedestrian to jump into the street and almost into the path of an oncoming car. A review of these new electronic fences has brought to light a number of problems, including the following:

- Many pet owners are oblivious to or deny the aggressiveness of their animals.
- Some dogs will run through the electronic field if they are determined to get out of the yard.
- Electronic fences provide no visible or physical barrier between the animal and people using the sidewalk or street, making it easier for aggressive animals to intimidate people passing by.



- If the batteries in the electronic shock collar are not fully charged or if there is a power interruption in the electronic field itself, a dog can escape from the yard without being shocked.

According to the action of the Elmhurst City Council, "... an electric or radio fence, also known as an 'invisible fence,' shall not be deemed an enclosure, confinement or restraint." This revision to the Municipal Code does not make electronic fences illegal per se. It does specify, however, that they are not considered an adequate method of restraining a dog under the law. Should a dog intimidate a passerby or escape from the property altogether, the owner would be subject to ticketing under the ordinance and may be subject to civil liability as well.

Main Street Conference

If you have been an Elmhurst resident for more than a few years, you have seen some exciting changes in the downtown shopping district. These include public improvements, such as the new public plaza and fountain, a tri-level parking facility, attractive streetscape improvements and wayfinding signs, in addition to the many private sector development and redevelopment projects. Elmhurst residents are not the only people to notice the changes: Illinois Main Street has also noticed and is planning to hold its annual conference and awards dinner May 1st through May 3rd in Elmhurst. The conference will bring together some 400 Main Street staff members and people from around the state to share ideas and learn more about revitalizing their downtowns. As conference host, Elmhurst City Centre will be showcasing central business district successes and providing attendees with a working laboratory of revitalization in action. The conference will include a special "Cool Cars Under the Stars," as well as visits to local attractions and presentation of awards by Lt. Governor Wood. Elmhurst has received two Main Street awards: the 1999 Special Events award for "Cool Cars Under the Stars" and the 2000 Marketing Award for "The Great TV Turnoff."

Citizen Survey Coming Soon

The City will soon be surveying a cross-section of Elmhurst residents. The survey, which is sent out every two years, provides a valuable "snapshot" of the concerns, priorities and impressions of the residents. The results help elected officials and staff better meet the needs of the community. The survey will be mailed to approximately 1,600 residents in June. If you receive one, please fill it out as completely as possible and return it to City Hall by the deadline. Your opinions are important and make a difference in the services provided by the City. For example, the anti-speeding program ("It's Our Town . . . Let's Slow Down"), the annual "Spring Clean-Up" and the taping of City Council meetings all came about, at least in part, as a result of resident feedback from earlier citizen surveys.



It's Our Town, Let's Slow Down

The Elmhurst Police Department reminds the driving public that speeding is a concern on city streets. The majority of those ticketed for exceeding the speed limit or driving recklessly are Elmhurst residents. Early in 1999, the City responded to residents' concerns by initiating a program called "It's Our Town, Let's Slow Down" aimed at discouraging speeding and promoting traffic safety. In a continuing effort by the police to make Elmhurst safer, new speed limit signs were recently posted at the entrances to town and a second speed monitoring (S.M.A.R.T.) trailer was purchased. The new S.M.A.R.T. trailer has a lower profile and new

electronics that allow it to run longer without being recharged. As an added reminder for speeding



motorists to slow down, the new S.M.A.R.T. trailer flashes when a vehicle is seriously exceeding the speed limit. The Police Department encourages motorists to drive carefully and obey speed limits. Parents, please remind teenage drivers that driving is a privilege, not a right, and that traffic laws exist to keep them and others safe. (Drivers are also reminded that, at intersections without traffic lights or signs, the driver on the right has the right-of-way. Be cautious when approaching any intersection.)

Lock Cars and Garages

Unlocked autos and garages are easy targets for criminals. The Police Department cautions residents to keep garage doors locked and lock cars even when parked in the driveway. Never leave valuables in plain sight, even in a locked car.

Fire Safety – Every Second Counts


The Elmhurst Fire Department reminds residents that, when it comes to fire safety, every second counts. Small fires become big fires very quickly, especially since today's furniture and accessories are often made from synthetics and polymers that burn twice as hot as natural fibers, such as cotton or wool. A fire can double in size every minute and, depending on conditions and furnishings, an entire room may be fully involved in less than five minutes. At the first sign of fire, get out of the house immediately and then call 911. For the safety of your family and the firefighters who respond to your call, call 911 at the first sign of fire. The sooner the Fire Department is notified, the better the chances are that the fire can be stopped before it gets out of control.

“CPR for Family and Friends”

The Elmhurst Fire Department will offer “CPR for Family and Friends,” an American Heart Association non-certification class, at Fire Station #1, 404 N. York, on the following dates: Saturday, February 16th; Saturday, April 13th; Tuesday, June 11th; Saturday, August 3rd; Saturday, October 12th; and Tuesday, December 3rd. Saturday classes run from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and Tuesday classes are held from 6:00 to 10:00 p.m. The class covers methods of administering CPR to infants, children and adults, as well as instructions on clearing airway obstructions. The course is intended for non-medical individuals over the age of 12. There is a charge of \$5.00 per participant and each class is limited to 25 students. Call (630) 530-3090 to reserve a spot.

Smoke Alarms Save Lives

Over 76% of all fire deaths (some 4,000 per year in the U.S.) occur in the home. Most of these deaths are not caused by heat or flames, but from inhaling smoke and toxic fumes. The poisonous gases emitted by a fire actually put people into a deeper sleep and many suffo-

cate without ever waking up or becoming aware of the fire. Installing and maintaining a working smoke alarm can double your chances of surviving a fire. It is important to install a smoke alarm near each sleeping area and on every level of your home. The alarms should not be placed near fans or air ducts that might blow smoke away from the sensor. Also, avoid placing smoke alarms near the kitchen stove or bathroom shower. Always follow the manufacturer's recommendations for installation, operation, maintenance and cleaning. Test your smoke alarm every month and replace the batteries at least once a year. It is recommended that smoke alarms be replaced every ten years.

Prevent Candle Fires

The increased popularity of candles has led to a 300% increase in candle fires in the past ten years. The Elmhurst Fire Department wants to help snuff out these dangerous fires. Candles may create a special ambiance and reduce stress but they are also very dangerous. You can help keep your family safe and your home intact by following a few simple tips:

- Keep candles away from combustible materials.
- Put candles in sturdy, non-combustible holders that won't tip over and are big enough to collect dripping wax.
- Extinguish all candles before leaving a room or going to sleep.
- Never place candles near windows where blinds or curtains can accidentally close over them.
- Never use candles where children or pets can knock them over.
- Never leave a child unattended in a room with a lit candle.
- During a power outage, use a safer light source, such as a flashlight or other battery-powered light.

Mayor's Message



In January of this year, I gave my annual State of the City address. While our country is at war and we are now officially in a recession, the state of Elmhurst is excellent. We are fortunate to have good financial

consultants who advised us during the prosperous economic times of the 90s to build fund balances that could carry us through difficult economic times. In addition, we have had sound fiscal management through the leadership of City Manager Thomas Borchert and Finance Director Marilyn Gaston.

Over the last year, however, we have had to tap into our fund balances and have drawn them down by 25%. As a result, we have had to increase the city's property tax levy by 4% this year—after two years without any increase. To reduce our costs, we have cut long-term capital expenditures on street resurfacing by 25%. We are now resurfacing approximately five miles of roadway per year—a more typical program than the aggressive “catch-up” work we had undertaken over the last several years. We've also postponed major renovations at the Elmhurst Historical Museum for one year. We believe that these measures are a prudent approach to husbanding our resources. As you can see, now more than ever, it's important to shop Elmhurst and keep sales tax dollars in our community.

We are also continuing to address the issue of homeland security. I recently returned from a U.S. Conference of Mayors trip to the White House where we met with President Bush and his homeland security advisor, Tom Ridge. The President's overall message was that the White House is relying on municipalities to be the front line respondents to any attacks on our nation. As you probably know, the first respondents to the September 11 attacks were municipal employees—firefighters and police officers—366 of whom were lost that day.

We need to work, as a community, on improving our ability to respond to all types of attacks—including chemical and biological—and to implement coordinated mutual aid agreements with other communities based on the MABAS model (Mutual Aid Box Alarm System) now being used across the country. This would enable us to call on assistance from fire departments throughout the State of Illinois and southern Wisconsin. During our meeting, the President also announced the institution of a \$32 billion homeland security package with a large portion of these funds directed to the individual municipalities. These monies will be used for special training and equipment. Security issues will continue to be uppermost in our minds as we work throughout the year to enhance the safety of our citizens.

As with any issue that impacts our community, we are always concerned about the opinions of our residents. A City of Elmhurst citizens survey will soon be mailed to a random sampling of our residents. If you receive the survey, I ask you to please take the time to fill it out. Your feedback is an important tool for your elected officials in determining the expectations of our citizens.

Lastly, I'd like to invite each and every one of you to join me for this year's St. Patrick's Day Parade, Saturday, March 16, 12 noon, on Spring Road.

Parkway Signs



Residents and business owners are reminded that placing signs, posters or advertisements of any kind on parkways, parkway trees, lampposts, telephone poles or any other public property anywhere in the City is not allowed. This common practice is not only unsightly, but also illegal.

Pedestrian Safety Tips

Pedestrian/vehicle accidents claim thousands of lives each year nationwide. Children and seniors are especially vulnerable. Pedestrians must take responsibility for their own safety because the potential for serious injury is so great in such accidents. The Elmhurst Police Department offers the following safety tips for pedestrians:

- Never cross in mid-block, especially near parked cars.
- Use crosswalks when available and stay on the curb until oncoming traffic stops. Never assume that a car will stop, even at a red light or stop sign.
- Walk on the sidewalk or, if there is no sidewalk, on the left side of the street facing traffic.
- Wear reflective or light-colored clothing when walking at night.
- At crosswalks with pedestrian signals, when the signal indicates “Walk,” check to make sure vehicles are not turning or running the red light, and then proceed with caution. If the “Don't Walk” signal begins flashing when you are in the street, keep going. Do not turn around and go back. If the “Don't Walk” signal begins flashing before you step off the curb, do not enter the intersection.





Senior Health and Safety Fair

Seniors, their families and other interested individuals are invited to attend the Senior Health and Safety Fair on Wednesday, April 24, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. The fair will be held again this year at the Elmhurst Memorial Center for Health, 1200 S. York St., Elmhurst. Comprehensive cholesterol screening (HDL, LDL and triglycerides) will be available for a \$20 fee (12-hour fast required). Please call CareMatch at 782-7878 to pre-register for the cholesterol screening. Osteoporosis screening will also be offered for a \$5 fee. Call the Abbey at 993-8989 between 8:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday to pre-register. Free vision, hearing, blood pressure and glucose (diabetes) screenings will be offered. The fair will also include refreshments, interesting exhibits, and information on volunteer opportunities. Bring in your used eyeglasses, hearing aids and plastic prescription/medicine/vitamin bottles for donation to the needy.

Elmhurst Youth Awards

City Vehicle Stickers

Vehicle stickers will be sold at a discount March 1-April 30. After May 1, stickers are sold at full price. If you do not receive an application in the mail, you may print one from the City's web site (www.elmhurst.org), pick one up at City Hall or call to have one mailed. To save time and avoid long lines, residents are encouraged to mail the completed application and fee to City Hall, or drop it in the white drop box in the parking lot. Your vehicle sticker and receipt will be returned by mail. You may also purchase your sticker in person at City Hall. To avoid potential penalties, please purchase and display your sticker by May 1. The money collected by the sale of vehicle stickers goes into the General Fund and is earmarked for roadway maintenance. For more information, call 530-3118.

Public Works *Working for You*

Hazardous Materials Drop-Off

The DuPage County Solid Waste Department will sponsor two one-day, mobile collection events this spring for residentially generated household hazardous waste products that are poisonous, flammable, corrosive and/or reactive. The one-day events at DuPage County locations are open to the public and free of charge. The collection events will be held on March 16th from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Rockwell site, 8245 S. Lemont Road in Darien and on April 27th from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the College of DuPage. Household hazardous wastes are also accepted every Saturday and Sunday throughout the year from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the permanent site at Naperville Fire station #4. Call the DuPage County Household Hazardous Waste Hotline at 510-2810 for more information.

Cost Sharing Programs



Residents with problems, such as deteriorating sidewalks, poor water drainage, diseased elm trees, sewer backup, sewer line root damage or driveway approach damage caused by parkway tree roots, may be eligible for financial assistance from the City through one of the following cost-sharing programs:

- Dutch Elm Disease Injection Program
- Dutch Elm Disease Removal Program
- Overhead Sewer Program
- Private Sanitary Sewer Line Repair Program
- Sidewalk Cost-Sharing Program
- Rear Yard Drain Program
- Driveway Approach Damage by Parkway Trees

North York Street Reconstruction

The City of Elmhurst is sponsoring a project to widen and reconstruct N. York Street from Columbia Avenue to just south of Lake Street to improve "ride-ability" and roadway safety. The project will be partially funded through a federal grant. When complete, the roadway will have two lanes in each direction with a center left turn lane, as well as new sidewalks, streetlights and watermain. Construction is anticipated to start in March 2002 and will be staged to provide two-way traffic at all times. Access to businesses will be maintained as the project proceeds, but south-bound left turns will be prohibited during construction. A regional detour plan will be posted. Completion is anticipated in the winter of 2002. Project updates will be posted periodically on the City's website during construction. Lake Street Reconstruction

The City of Elmhurst is co-sponsoring a project with the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) to widen and reconstruct Lake Street (U.S. Route 20) from Robert Kingery Highway (IL Route 83) to just east of Walnut. The project will be partially funded through a federal grant and is necessary to improve signal timing, "ride-ability" and roadway safety. When complete, the roadway will have two lanes in each direction with a center left turn lane, as well as new traffic signals, streetlights and storm sewers. Construction is anticipated to start in spring of 2002. The construction will be staged to provide two-way traffic at all times. Access to businesses will be maintained and a regional detour plan will be posted. Completion is anticipated in the winter of 2002. Project updates will be posted periodically on the City's website. Free Wood Chips

Wood chips are generally available year round and are delivered to residents on a first-come, first-served basis. Please be aware that wood chips are delivered by the truckload (approximately 10 cubic yards or 80 wheel-barrels). Neighbors may wish to share a load. Call 530-3038 to get your name on the waiting list. If you only need a small amount, you can pick up wood chips year-round at the base of the water tower in Butterfield Park. Feel free to help yourself.



Refuse and Recycling Reminders

- The City, through its contract waste hauler (B.F.I.), offers an optional 96-gallon toter that residents may use in lieu of 33-gallon garbage cans. The toter is rented from B.F.I. and comes at an additional cost of \$3.00 per month. If you would like to sign up to use the toter for one year (minimum required), you can pick up the necessary form at City Hall or call 530-3020 to have one mailed or faxed to you. The toter will be delivered by B.F.I.
- If your regular collection day is Wednesday or Thursday, and your refuse or recycling is missed, call Public Works at 530-3020 the following morning between 8:30 and 11:00 a.m. If your pickup day is Friday, call BFI at 708-345-7050 on Saturday morning before 11:00 a.m.
- If you plan to put large items or white goods (large household appliances) at the curb for pick up, please notify B.F.I. at 708-345-7050 one day prior to your collection day to allow them to dispatch the correct truck.
- The City's recycling program will not add #3, #4, #5 or #7 plastics in the foreseeable future as the City's waste hauler has no resource that accepts these materials.
- Refuse, recycling and yard waste (April 1 through November 30) must be set out by 6:00 a.m. on your collection day. All garbage containers should be removed from the parkway by 7:00 p.m. that evening.

Yard Waste Pickup



Yard waste pickup will resume the week of April 1 on your regularly scheduled refuse collection day. Yard waste includes leaves, brush, shrubbery trimmings, twigs, dead flowers and weeds (with soil removed). Sod, rocks, earth, vegetable plants and fruit are not considered yard waste and should be included with other refuse. Yard waste may be put in 30-gallon brown Kraft paper bags or in 33-gallon garbage cans clearly marked "Yard Waste Only" (labels available at the Public Works counter). The bags or cans may not weigh more than 50 pounds. One clearly visible yard waste sticker is required for each bag or container. In addition, a maximum of two bundles of brush will be picked up each week at no extra cost. Brush bundles may not exceed four feet in length or weigh more than 50 pounds each. Branches may not exceed four inches in diameter.

Spring Clean-Up

The third annual Spring Clean-Up will be held in May on either Wednesday, May 9; Thursday, May 10; or Friday, May 11 — whichever is your regular refuse collection day. On your Spring Clean-Up day, BFI will collect furniture, appliances, fixtures, carpet, construction and demolition debris (up to two cubic yards) and bulk items. Stickers are not required for this special pickup. Yard waste, tires, car batteries, riding lawn mowers, liquids and hazardous materials are not accepted during Spring Clean-Up.

2002 Fire Hydrant Flushing Schedule

The City's Public Works Department will begin the annual hydrant-flushing program on April 1. The operation will take place Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. and will be completed over a five-week period. Hydrants are regularly flushed to ensure that they are working properly and will be available for Fire Department use.
