A New City Council for Elmhurst

A special City Council meeting was held on April 27th to swear in newly elected members of the Elmhurst City Council. Peter “Pete” DiCianni was chosen by Elmhurst voters to serve as Elmhurst’s new mayor. Mayor DiCianni replaces Mayor Thomas Marcucci who retired after holding that office for 16 years. Incumbents re-elected are City Clerk Patty Spencer and Aldermen Norman Leader, 2nd Ward, and Michael Bram, 3rd Ward. Newly elected members of the City Council are City Treasurer David Dyer; Aldermen Paula Pezza, 1st Ward; Kevin York, 4th Ward; Chris Healy, 5th Ward; Jim Kennedy, 6th Ward; and Patrick Wagner, 7th Ward.

City of Elmhurst Receives Superior Bond Rating

On March 2, City of Elmhurst officials were pleased to learn that the City of Elmhurst bond rating had been upgraded to an upper level bond (credit) rating of AA+ from ratings service Standard & Poor’s (S&P). The AA+ standard long-term rating assigned to Elmhurst’s series 2009 general obligation (GO) bonds reflects the City’s: 1) participation in the diverse Chicago metropolitan area economy; 2) healthy income level; 3) strong financial operations and reserves; and 4) moderate overall debt burden.

Credit ratings by financial experts such as Standard & Poor’s reflect their professional, independent assessment about credit risk. S&P’s ratings express the agency’s outlook about the ability and willingness of an issuer, such as a corporation, state or city government, to meet financial obligations in full and on time. Approximately one in seven rated local governments in Illinois have a rating equal to or higher than the AA+ level.

S&P Rating Services views the City’s income level as very strong — at 148 percent of the national level. The city’s tax base grew at an average annual rate of 10 percent between 2003 and 2007— to an estimated market value of \$6.76 billion, which is an extremely strong \$156,200 per capita. The tax base is very diverse, with the 10 largest taxpayers accounting for only four percent of equalized assessed valuation.

The AA+ bond rating has been used to support the issuance of \$10 million in GO bonds by the City of Elmhurst to finance planned parking deck construction in the downtown. The City’s stable outlook reflects S&P’s confidence that the City’s management team will continue to provide balanced operations and maintain strong reserves, despite drops in economically sensitive tax revenues due to the current economic downturn.

According to City Manager Tom Borchert, “This is great news. The City’s ability to pay, the Council’s policy on finance and the quality of staff management have been affirmed by S&P”

City Budget Approved

The City Council voted on April 6 to approve the 2009-10 City of Elmhurst Budget. In this time of deteriorating economic conditions and declining revenue, the goal of elected officials and staff was to identify and fund the most essential municipal services, including infrastructure, public safety and other necessary programs that affect the majority of residents. Many other beneficial but less essential programs and services were eliminated, reduced or deferred.

Among those programs eliminated were out-of-state conferences and travel, membership in the DuPage Convention and Visitors Bureau, and City contributions to sidewalk repair, the Dutch Elm Disease injection program, rear yard drains and parkway tree planting. Reductions were made in the areas of overtime and seasonal labor, employee relations and training, police and fire public education, Historical Museum exhibits and educational programs, mosquito control, street sweeping, sidewalk slab-jacking and the Community Grant Program. Replacements of some vehicles, equipment and electronics were deferred. Rubbish collection fees were increased to help cover city expenses. These actions resulted in a total of over \$4 million in savings.

Living Green

Conserving Water

The warm, sunny days of late spring and early summer will soon motivate people to get grass, flowers and vegetables growing again. This work inevitably includes watering, especially in an attempt to achieve the beautifully maintained lawns that make our neighborhoods so attractive. Excessive watering, however, creates a shallow root system and makes the grass more vulnerable during dry conditions. (Residents are reminded of sprinkling regulations — from 8 p.m. to 8 a.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday for even-numbered addresses, and Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday for odd-numbered addresses.) Keep mower blades up high to produce a vigorous lawn that is more tolerant of dry conditions and better able to compete with weeds. Do your lawn and the environment a favor by conserving water.



Beginning in 2009 the DuPage Water Commission (DWC) and public water suppliers in DuPage County have committed to use less water and conserve our valuable Great Lakes water sources.

Remembering Our Armed Forces

Elmhurst residents and visitors can honor the courageous men and women of the United States Armed Forces, past and present, by attending the 91st Elmhurst Memorial Day Parade on Monday, May 25th. The parade will step off from the corner of York and Third at 9:30 a.m. and proceed south by way of York Street, Robert Palmer Drive and Church Street, to the Veterans Memorial in Wilder Park. The parade will be followed by a military ceremony with speakers, patriotic music and the laying of wreaths to honor fallen members of the armed forces.

The Grand Marshall of the 2009 Memorial Day Parade will be W. Glenn Cross, Jr., a Corporal during the Korean War and recipient of three Purple Hearts, two Bronze Stars, and other medals and commendations. While serving in an area known as "Heart Break Hill," Cross single-handedly defended the area with a machine gun, grenades and an M2 automatic rifle from an overwhelming number of enemy troops, while the rest of his unit set up a new line of defense. In spite of shrapnel wounds, he wanted nothing more than to get back to his unit. He was often sent under cover of darkness to blow up the enemy's ammunition stores and bunkers.



The Water Conservation and Protection Program pledges to reduce water demand by 10 percent over the next ten years by educating consumers about water conservation techniques, eliminating leaks and other water loss, using native plants that demand less water and practicing other conservation measures.

In keeping with the City's green initiative and focus on water conservation, the main attraction of Cool Kiddie Art in downtown Elmhurst this summer will be 55-gallon rain barrels made of recycled plastic and hand-painted by local artists. Cool Kiddie Art is a joint venture between the City, the Elmhurst City Centre and the Elmhurst Children's Assistance Foundation (ECAAF). Along with the Cool Kiddie Cars, the barrels will be auctioned off with proceeds used to assist families of children with serious medical problems or disabling conditions. If your bid doesn't win you a rain barrel, you will be able to buy a 55-gallon barrel for \$80 from the City in cooperation with the Conservation Foundation.

Gardening with Native Plants



Residents interested in landscaping in an ecological, cost-effective and attractive manner are urged to consider incorporating native plants into their outdoor design. Because they are naturally suited to the area, native plants are hardy, drought-resistant and low maintenance. Most native species are perennial or self-seeding biennial plants that attract songbirds and insects that prey on pests, thus decreasing the need for pesticide use.

To help you select the most appropriate species for your site, consider the environmental conditions of the area, including soil type, moisture and sunlight. Become familiar with the scientific names of various plant varieties native to the midwestern region. When ordering seeds or plants from a nursery, keep in mind that they may carry several varieties of a particular plant, some of which are not native to this area. Digging plants from natural areas is ecologically disruptive and possibly illegal.

Improve fertility and water retention by incorporating compost or other organic matter into the soil. Mulching will help eliminate competition from weeds. Patience is required as your native plants become established and the process may take three to five years of weeding, mulching and watering comparable to traditional landscaping. Keep in mind that you are helping to create a stable ecosystem that can flourish for many years with little maintenance.

Cool Cities Pledge

In October 2007, former Elmhurst Mayor Thomas Marcucci signed the “Cool Cities Pledge” to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in Elmhurst to seven percent below the amount discharged in 1990 and to achieve that goal by 2012. City staff recently completed the municipal greenhouse gas inventory to measure the amount of greenhouse gas emitted in 1990 and in 2007. When the numbers were crunched, it was found that Elmhurst’s municipal GHG emissions in 2007 had fallen to 40 percent below its 1990 levels – from 11,000 metric tons to 6,900 metric tons.



The main reason for the emissions decrease was the elimination of deep-well water pumps when Elmhurst switched to Lake Michigan water. The water pumps alone emitted about 4,900 metric tons of GHG a year, an excellent reminder that saving water saves energy. While overall GHG emissions fell, the inventory identified growing energy consumption for street lighting, a major source of energy usage. Elmhurst is looking into bids for a complete energy audit of all municipal operations, and examining equipment, structures and procedures for increased efficiencies.

How to Recycle “Non-Recyclables”

In a recent water bill, residents received a list of recyclable items accepted in the City’s curbside recycling program. Many other items can be recycled or reused in other ways, however.



■ Electronics, including TVs, computers, cameras, radios, video and DVD players, telephones and CD players, should not be disposed of in a landfill, since many contain harmful metals that can cause serious health problems. There are companies that pick up old computers and electronics. Ink and laser cartridges can be taken to local retailers. Old cell phones can be donated and reused.

■ Donate books, usable bikes, cars, housewares, furniture, toys and clothing to a local charity or advertise them on www.craigslist.com or www.freecycle.org. You may also donate unbroken window glass and mirrors through www.freecycle.org.

■ Donate your old but usable appliances to a charity or a local family that can use it or at the web addresses above, offering them to someone who will pick them up. The delivery service that brings your new appliances may be willing to take the old ones, as well, but make sure they will be recycled and not sent to a landfill.

■ Many materials that remain after a construction project can be reused or recycled, including carpeting, lumber, roofing, siding, concrete and drywall. For any remodeling project, consider removing cabinetry, fixtures, doors, windows and flooring in such a way that these valuable materials can be reused or recycled.

■ Sell metal buckets, pipes, auto parts and many other items made of stainless steel, brass, bronze, copper, aluminum, etc., to a metal salvaging company.

■ Rechargeable batteries may contain toxic materials but many can be recycled. Call 1-800-BATTERY for drop-off locations in Elmhurst. There are also businesses in town that will take other types of batteries, as well.

■ Take used motor oil to a quick-lube shop or auto store. Never dump motor oil into a storm drain.

■ Even such efforts as reusing grocery bags, taking packing peanuts to a shipping store and returning clothes hangers to the dry cleaners, can make a huge difference when made by many people.

■ As much as the environmentally conscious would like to recycle or reuse everything, there are some items that simply must go into the trash, including diapers, tissue paper, rubber and vinyl hoses, and paper or cardboard that is food-contaminated.

■ Older compact fluorescent light bulbs contain small amounts of mercury and should not be thrown away with your regular trash or recycling. Go to the Elmhurst web site, www.elmhurst.org, for information on where you can recycle these bulbs.



■ Take other items (and their containers), such as pesticides, herbicides, antifreeze, pool chemicals and old gasoline, to the county household hazardous waste facility (HHW) at Naperville Fire Station #4, 1971 Brookdale Rd., Naperville. HHW items are accepted Saturday and Sunday, 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., except holidays. For information, call 630-420-4190.

With a little effort, you will be disposing of a very small amount of trash and contributing to a greener environment.

Bicycle Safety Tips



Earlier this year, former Mayor Thomas Marcucci appointed a Bicycle Task Force to encourage the use of bikes and make Elmhurst a more bicycle-friendly community. The Task Force offered the following guidelines to enable bicyclists and motorists to safely share the streets. Bicyclists are reminded that the law requires them to have a front headlight when biking at night, observe all traffic control signs, ride in the direction of traffic, observe all motor vehicle laws and signal when turning or stopping. Helmets, bright and/or reflective clothing and defensive riding are strongly encouraged. Motorists must maintain three feet between their vehicle and a cyclist, treat cyclists as another vehicle on the road, observe all traffic control signs, signal their intentions and wear seat belts. The Task Force recommends that motorists pull to the side of the road to talk on a cell phone or send text messages and to be courteous to others on the road. The curfew in Elmhurst is from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. Sunday through Thursday and from midnight on Friday and Saturday until 6 a.m. the following morning.

Please be aware that a vehicle sticker must be purchased and displayed by May 1 on any vehicle registered or principally garaged in Elmhurst. Failure to comply with this city regulation can result in a \$25 fine during May and a \$50 fine thereafter.



Garage Sales

A garage sale is a great way to make a little extra money by selling items you no longer need. No permit is required and you may hold up to two garage sales a year. Signs may be posted on the private property where the garage sale is taking place, but never on parkway grass (the area between the street and the sidewalk), parkway trees or light poles. Please remove the signs as soon as your sale is over.

Fines Increased for Drug Paraphernalia

The City Council recently approved an increase in fines associated with cannabis and drug paraphernalia violations. Under local Elmhurst ordinances (Municipal Code 51.53), it is illegal for any person to grow, possess, or in any way sell, trade or distribute cannabis (marijuana). A violation of this ordinance can now result in a fine of not less than \$500 and not more than \$1,000. Additionally, anyone who produces, sells or possesses drug paraphernalia is in violation of Municipal Code Section 51.55 and may incur a fine between \$750 and \$1,000.

Fireworks: What's Legal and What's Not

Residents are reminded that any fireworks that cannot be legally purchased in Illinois are also illegal in Elmhurst. Devices such as sparklers, snakes, glow worm pellets, smoke devices and trick noisemakers are allowed at any time. Be aware, however, that seemingly harmless devices such as sparklers burn in excess of 1,000 degrees Fahrenheit and can cause serious burns. Children should never be allowed to use them without adult supervision.



Lock It or Lose It

Every summer, the police see more thefts and burglaries to vehicles and homes. Although there is no way to control a criminal's desire to commit crimes, we can take steps to remove the opportunity by locking the doors and windows of our homes and vehicles. Many thefts to vehicles involve valuables — such as laptop computers, GPS units, purses, portable media players, tools, cell phones and packages — left in plain view in locked or unlocked vehicles. Lock car doors at home, or at a gas station, grocery store, mall or restaurant. An open door and valuables in plain sight are an open invitation for a thief to help himself.



Controlling Unwelcome Wildlife

The arrival of warm weather often brings an increase in wildlife problems. Following are suggestions to help make your property less appealing to unwanted animals.

- Eliminate food sources, including garbage, bird seed, pet food and grease, from grills.
- Fence in gardens and flower boxes and never feed deer or other wildlife.
- Limit access to your attic, chimney and yard by trimming bushes and tree limbs back and blocking off gaps under fences.
- Treat lawns for grubs yearly, during the last week in June or the first week in July.
- If an animal burrows under your foundation or in your yard, make their home less attractive by playing a radio tuned to a rock station near the animal's hole night and day. If this doesn't work, put a strand of blinking Christmas lights as far as possible into the hole and leave it on 24 hours a day. Depending on the size of the hole, you can also place a roll of paper towels or toilet paper soaked in ammonia in the hole and re-soak it every few days.

Facts about Flooding

Certain areas within the community experienced flooding following storms last fall and winter. Although a small number of residents were impacted, the experience can be upsetting and costly. It is important to understand how different areas are impacted by different types of flooding, and what can be done in each case.

Overbank flowing occurs when stream capacity is exceeded and water flows into the surrounding area, known as the floodplain. Properties in the floodplain are susceptible to this type of flooding, as many homeowners experienced during the flood of 1987. Since that time, the city and the county have invested in extensive flood protection projects that have largely controlled overbank flooding.


Street flooding occurs when a severe storm exceeds the ability of the storm sewer system to take in and convey water. Storm water is then held "in storage" in streets and drainage-ways until the storm sewers can drain out.

When water is held in the streets, homes with downward-sloped driveways are most vulnerable to flooding. Street flooding is often aggravated by clogged inlets where water will not drain quickly. While the City has an aggressive street sweeping program, the amount of leaves in the street each fall can be extremely heavy. With enough advance warning, city crews proactively sweep problem areas prior to a storm's arrival. In some cases, wind and rain are severe enough to

knock leaves off the trees and largely negate these efforts. In addition, there are some 5,000 inlets throughout the community — making it impossible for City crews to attend to each one. For this reason, residents are urged to keep storm inlets clear of debris and leaves.

Overland flooding occurs on property at the bottom of a hill, even a hill with a very slight incline. Sometimes the incline is so gradual that the only way to see it is on a contour map. Although nothing can be done to change the topography of the area, the City works with property owners to protect the home even though the land will flood.

Sanitary sewer back-ups occur when the system is surcharged from clean water entering the system due to sump pumps that are illegally hooked up to it (inflow) or through small cracks and open joints in the pipe (infiltration). The City invests nearly \$1 million annually on sanitary sewer lining to prevent inflow and infiltration, but any home that is directly connected to the sanitary sewer without some mechanism to prevent backflow will be at risk. In this case, the only way to prevent sewer back-up is to install an overhead sewer that prevents sanitary sewer water from backing up into the house. The City offers a 50/50 overhead sewer cost sharing program with homeowners, up to a maximum of \$5,000. For more information about this program, please call 630-530-3779.
